DHW will be developing a school-based referral pathway for non-criminal justice involved adolescents with a focus on clients with co-occurring disorders. DHW

is working closely with regional school districts to develop a school-based referral process. DHW currently plans to pilot services for this population in Region 3 while the change of scope request is approved by SAMHSA.

In an effort to create a more convenient case manager certification process, applicants may now meet the case manager training requirement through selfdirected study. BPA's PowerPoint training presentation has been posted on the Division's Recovery Support Services website (link below), along with the case management standards manual, and a training declaration form to be signed by the case manager and their supervisor upon completion. Applicants are expected to review and

understand these materials, and the IDAPA standards for case management, prior to signing the declaration form. Please remember that case manager applicants will still need to submit documentation of education and experience to the Department. Once this information is verified. they will be added to the Qualified Case Manager list with the expectation that the self-directed training will be completed within 6 months of hire.

1. We would like to welcome the following providers to the network:

- Rawlings Community Counseling out of Bonners Ferry is approved to provide Adult & Adolescent OP, IOP, CCM, & CM effective 1/18/12.
- Region 7 Little People's Academy out of Idaho Falls is approved to provide Child Care effective 3/1/12.
- Absolute Drug Testing in Region 1 is approved for both Adolescent & Adult drug testing effective 3/20/12
- Wienhoff Drug Testing in Region 3 & 4 is approved for both Adult & Adolescent drug testing effective 3/23/12.
- My House in Region 5 is approved for Adult SSH effective 4/5/12
- Easter Seals Goodwill is now approved to provide Adult Outpatient, Intensive Outpatient, Clinical Case Management, Case Management, Life Skills, & Transportation services effective 4/13/12.
- Transylvania Express is approved to provide transportation services for Adults & Adolescents effective 4/14/12



- We have continued to experience increases in call volume over the past 6 months with an average of 3300 calls per month from clients, providers and referral sources, with 92% of calls answered within 180 seconds.
- Less than 4% of calls were abandoned.
- The Frontline conducted 807 Phone Screenings in March and processed 538 paper pathway intakes. This is a 14.9% increase over February.
- 3. Updates from the Claims Department:
  - Over the past three months, BPA has paid 99.15% claims within 14 days.
  - The average turn-around time (claims received to claims paid) has been 3 days.
